Also, don't be afraid to step away for a while. I passed the CWNA and CWSP in 2007/2008 and then changed careers and left CWNP behind to focus on trying to pass my BCSI. By the time was back in the wifi game those had expired and I had to start over but my understanding and absorption and retainment from the previous time was immeasurable and VERY helpful in mastering the deep advanced topics included in these tests.

## **What value will your CWNE provide to you, your clients, and/or your company?**

It has provided me great value since it got added to my signature in 2015. It sets the level of expectations for my customers to understand that I am coming from a position of knowledge and it has also let me sit at almost any table and be accepted as someone who deserves to talk at that table.
