What is your level of industry experience?

I have been designing, implementing and troubleshooting wireless networks for over 10 years across both partner, solution integrator and vendors. During that time this has ranged from completing wireless surveys to presenting wireless design best practices at conferences.

Where did you receive your training/education?

For my technical training, I am mostly self-taught mostly through books but occasionally through the use of self-paced web training. I also have a BSc. (Hons) in Physics from the University of Manchester in the UK.



When did you first become interested in wireless?

I first developed an interest for wireless communications during my undergraduate Physics degree at the University of Manchester, when my lab partner and I completed a lab project on the 'Physics of Electromagnetic Radiation (Microwave) Propagation through Copper Waveguide Conduits'. In this project we have to observe the relative change in signal intensity of a microwave frequency carrier signal through various 2" x 1" copper waveguide junctions and mathematically derive the equations that explained the signal intensity changes.
